BASIN BOUND: ABSURDITY FOUND

Federal government of both sides have presided over a plan to save the Murray Darling Basin.

It is the biggest water reform since Federation, based on political deception, ignorance, scientific perjury, greed, corruption and the raping of our countryside.

And all this is from the information PUBLIC-LY AVAILABLE.

The Darling, the Murray, the Murrumbidgee, all a mess, but for very different reasons.

The Darling is in trouble from insufficient flow and Murray Darling Basin Plan Sustainable Diversion Limit objectives.

In 2021, in Australia, the average life expectancy for a male in Wilcannia is 38 years, yes 38! For women it is 42, forty bloody two!

If you want to protest about something, how about protest about our brothers and sisters who

are being robbed of the ability to have clean water, food and to teach their culture to their kids. This is happening NOW, as you read this, in Australia in 2021

What happens when you remove a food source for people who live on country? What happens when you remove the spiritual mother of the Barkindji? What happens to the kids who have nothing to do?

Michael Kennedy, who cannot teach his kids to fish, described it so well, "Our people were massacred, we then had the stolen generation and now we are the stolen water generation."

Michael isn't hysterically angry, he doesn't preach hate of white oppression, he doesn't want money, he wants access to water! Clean, viable, life giving water!

Their river is now dry more often than not, and yet a flowing river is an integral part of their cul-

ture. We also met Barkindji woman, Muriel Riley, stolen from her home and the river when she was just five years old and now, 60 years later, the river is being taken from her again.

Remember, the two defining priorities of the plan are environment and critical human needs.

The destruction got worse at Menindee, the ecological hotspot that carried more water birds than Kakadu, not to mention fish, kangaroos, and food production.

Fields of dead plantings, lakes like deserts and broken people. The former 2,000 gigalitre, four Sydney Harbours, lake system now targeted to be no more than 88 gigalitres. That's efficiency!

Locals described watching the kangaroos starve to death, fish kills, the death of tourism and depopulation.

The once thriving ecosystems and viable community now another victim of water reform.

Our trip coincided with a NSW Upper House Inquiry into the lake system. We sat and listened as black, white and green all spoke with a common voice. From Elders, environmentalists, town councillors and food producers, a common theme – governments that listen but do not hear, objectives set in stone no matter the cost, expendable people.

Philip Glyde of the Murray Darling Basin Authority once summed up the plan as having, 'winners and losers'.

Maybe that is what happens to areas of limited political power, you become the unfortunates, the losers.

The NSW Government is still pushing ahead to licence floodplain harvesting, a move that could cement the destruction of these communities.

In 2015, three years after the start of implementing the Murray-Darling Basin Plan, a Senate Inquiry was held amid concerns about the manner in which this 'plan' was being rolled out.

Senators conducted an extensive inquiry and toured the Basin, listening to how the plan was failing communities and the environment. It was obvious, even at this point, that we have developed a dud.

The inquiry made 31 recommendations, none of which has been implemented.

Fast forward six years and we have had more than 100 reports, and the theme has been constant; there are massive problems with a Basin Plan that was built on poor modelling and selective science, is having a greater impact

on communities than was intended and, coupled with other water management changes, is hurting our agriculture sector.

Now, even the plan's instigator, former Prime Minister John Howard, is lamenting its failure, this week describing the plan as a 'tragedy'.

So, with all this evidence, one would expect decisive action to get to the bottom of the problem and do something to rectify it.

Instead, we get nothing.

While the National Party threatens to cross the floor over climate change, its parliamentarians - supposedly at the insistence of leader Michael McCormack – allow the plan to

From midnight Thursday (today), coronavirus restrictions have eased across Victoria.

From 11.59pm, Wednesday February 17, 2021:

- The four reasons to leave home and the 5km limit no longer apply.
- Masks will be required indoors, and outdoors when you cannot socially distance.
- You may have 5 visitors to your home.
- Up to 20 people are permitted at public gatherings.
- People can return to work up to 50% capacity for both the public and private sector.
- Schools to reopen.
- Retail and Hospitality return tomorrow to previous COVID density limits.
- There is no limit on numbers for funerals and weddings but density limits do apply.
- Sport and recreation to resume along with entertainment and public events, but with caps.

We are asked to trust the same departments who excluded key stakeholders in floodplain harvesting consultation because they 'weren't favourable'. Even former Murray Darling Basin Authority water expert, Maryanne Slattery, has evidence of excessive floodplain harvesting, an estimated 3,000 gigalitres or six Sydney Harbours.

It is also noteworthy that South Australia's water provided from NSW is basically set in stone. Even when the Darling historically provided 39% of SA's water and climate affecting basin inflows, they still receive 100%, pulled from the Murray, as well as the Murray supplying the new Broken Hill pipeline.

Our tour continued down the Darling and on to the Murray, the plan to save the basin kept on demonstrating its failings. Fields of salinity in new irrigation areas of almonds that, 20 years ago, were dry land paddocks.

The explosion of corporate agriculture, opening out new irrigation areas, putting in permanent plantings that require irrigation every year as opposed



to annual-grown when water is available.

Almonds for example, use more water per hectare than rice or cotton, every year. Just a reality.

The Murray issues include the largest geographical shift of water ever. Our Murray eroded more under a plan to save it than the last 100 years of river regula-

The Murray is not a ditch, it is a living river. It has natural constraints that currently agriculture, dilution, trade, conveyance, and end of system targets all ignore.

Hundreds of thousands of hect-

ares of wetlands and creeks now lay dormant in the mid Murray regions of Northern Victoria and Southern NSW after government water reform.

That is Australian food production and important ecosystem functions. Breeding, feeding, water, bugs, fish, snakes, owls, etc.

Are you starting to wonder why our Federal Environment Minister, Sussan Ley, or Federal Water Minister, Keith Pitt, don't have press releases about these issues?

Let me grab my tin foil hat and continue.

There is also the creation of

a \$2 billion unregulated water trading system. No regulation, no publicly accessible national register.

A water register, like the 2004 national water initiative called for, and the Feds spent \$30 million creating, to then abandon.

The government even trades water. The NSW Government held water in environmental accounts for water traders, the same water traders who compete against people trying to feed their animals and families, the same people who love their land and want to pass it on better than they found it.

The Murrumbidgee is basically

now cut off from the Murray through government assisted expansion of huge dams and corporate operations with pumps that make the river run backwards.

Then there are the community groups fighting government to stop them destroying their environment with ignorance and total disregard for wisdom of old souls.

There are problems with the bottom end of the basin also. The Murray does need water out the mouth but as an estuary, sometimes fresh, sometimes salty. Current basin plan objectives attempt to hold the Murray mouth open with fresh water, totally ignoring the impacts of the dams built down there for fresh water that caused silting up and formation of sand islands.

We are also attempting to hold the lower lakes above sea level, growing the lakes' huge surface area, increasing evaporation and fighting climate change, 50% less inflows and sea level rise predictions.

In a country as dry as ours we have even excluded the lower portion of South Australia from the whole plan, the thousands of kilometres of drains and ground water irrigation that once fed the Coorong. Country drained by white early South Australian farmers to turn swamps to farm-

There are basically problems everywhere, from corrupt elements in irrigation companies, government, lobbyists, and traders. Then there are all the good people caught up, the suicides, loss of schools, footy clubs, and health services. The depopulation and drying out of former floodplains.

I guarantee a process that created this huge national disgrace, treason and environmental destruction will not be fixed by the same process that created it, politics.

We need a different approach, communities, old souls, humility, and humans who view our land, ecosystems and sustainable farming in a wholistic sense.

Some currently feed off division as they line their pockets.

We went Basin Bound and I'm saddened by what we found.

Microchipping your pets

A microchip, which is about the size of a grain of rice, provides secure, reliable, and permanent identification for your pet and greatly increases the likelihood that your pet, if lost, can be returned to you.

But microchipping is only effective if your pet is also registered with your correct up to date contact information.

In NSW all cats and dogs, other than those that are exempt, must be microchipped by the age of 12 weeks or before being sold or given away, whichever happens first. In addition, all cats and dogs, other than those that are exempt, must be registered by six months of age. The registration fee in NSW is a once only payment which covers your cat or dog for life.

Saying goodbye is never easy and when the people you are bidding farewell to are not only an integral part of the community but have also become good friends, the goodbyes are even harder.

This week, 'adopted locals' Jane and Steve Wall will head off on a new venture which will take them back to the Sydney region where their families reside.

In between packing boxes, loading up the ute and tending to their beloved fur babies Nelson and Biscuit, Jane and Steve kindly set some time aside to sit down with me for a quick cuppa and chat.

Over the past few weeks, I have been stopped in the street by locals asking me if the rumour was true that their favourite police officers were leaving and if so, could I possibly do an interview with them (and beg them to stay!)

Well as much as I hate to be the bearer of bad news, the rumour is correct, although the decision was not an easy one for them to make.

Jane explains –

"Well, when we first came here in November 2011, our intention was to stay for 4 years and here we are after almost 9 years!"

"So that should give you some idea of how hard it was to leave," Steve includes, "we have been so welcomed by the community."



Prior to coming to Barham, Steve was working in Illawarra and Jane was in Hurstville which for her meant an hour and a half travel to work each day. An opportunity came up for them to relocate to rural NSW with a choice of stations at Barham, Moulamein, Hay or Balranald. Steve visited each of the towns to help in making his decision.

"I knew as soon as I arrived in Barham that this would be the place we would choose but I went to the others anyway. Jane was working night shift

at the time and she flew down for a few days to check it out."

It seems Jane did not need any convincing.

"I loved it straight away. It had great facilities and all the amenities we needed, and of course the great golf course which was important. I couldn't believe I could be at work literally in 2 minutes as we would be living directly behind the police station at that stage. Then when we moved into this place, it was just a 2 minute drive."

Steve took on the role as Lock-Up Keeper at Bar-

ham and Jane secured a job share position at the Deniliquin station, eventually transferring fulltime to Barham with Steve. Immediately the support they received from the local community was overwhelming and something they certainly did not take for granted.

"Right from the beginning the support has been fantastic. Working in a place such as Barham is so much more personal than Sydney. People here are so friendly and because the community is small you get to know everyone per-

sonally. But that can also have its downfalls in a time of crisis," Steve says.

"I agree," says Jane, "especially when there's tragedy because we know the family and we carry that baggage, like it's a loss to us too. That can be really hard. But it also means that you make more effort with the family and spend more time with them. I think the older we get the softer we

Steve says that his role in Barham has been a massive change from his policing days in Illawarra where he would be attending anything up to 6 jobs an hour. He says that for the most part, Barham has a very low crime rate which is something we should be proud of.

"Maybe it's because we make a point of getting to know the locals and yes, people will stuff up here and there but both Jane and I have always treated people with respect and kindness which comes back to us. People take notice in a small community, and they look out for one another. Here, you can rely on the public and that helps everyone. It certainly helps us to do our job better."

Both Steve and Jane had every intention of retiring here, and even purchased a block of land on the river to build a home on. But shortly after purchasing, it occurred to them just how much they were missing their extended families, in particular the special moments they were missing out on as grandparents. So with heavy hearts coupled with a sense of excitement, they knew they had to go

back home to be closer to their loved ones.

through Jane smiles teary eyes.

"As sad as it is to leave our wonderful friends and great community here, we are really looking forward to being near our family. Its been a long time since we left them and so we can't wait to have the opportunity to spend more time with them now. When we came here, we made a decision that we would make sure we were sociable which we did with golf, and we have made so many friends through that. I think that when you move to a community such as Barham that you need to have a hobby or you'd probably struggle. Another thing we did was to have these Triple 0 parties, so that all the emergency workers had a good relationship and worked well together. We used to do that quite regularly. We think that was really important. Moving back means that I'm going to a 5 day week 9 to 5 job which I haven't done for many years! My new role will be as Police Citizens Club Youth Case Manager which I'm really

excited about." Judging by the look on their faces, it is impossible not to be happy for Jane and Steve's new venture. Although they have made so many friends in their time here, it just does not quite compare with the love and support of family, but my goodness they will be missed.

"I think it will be good for the community to have some new faces. New people come with new ideas

and that will be exciting for Barham," Jane insists.

"Absolutely, and we'll come back to visit from time to time. I better keep packing, thanks for everything Ali," Steve gives me a hug as he heads back out

to the ute. "Ali, I would just like to say a huge 'thank you, thank you,' to the entire community. You have helped us do our job better and been so supportive with info to do our job well. Even when things were wrong, they are always respectful to us. We are both passionate about this community and for us to have done our job well we needed your support. I can't say enough about

Jane hugs me as we conclude the interview but not before a very tricky photo shoot out on the lawn with their two extremely friendly Labradors who think its playtime!

Crucial Solutions to Mismanagement of Water

Let us focus on the crucial solutions to rectifying the shocking mismanagement of our country's water resources. I applaud and agree with the concerns expressed by an ever-increasing number of representative bodies and individual citizens in our southern-connected Basin regarding the misguided and unnecessary devastation inflicted on our irrigation farmers and reliant industries and communities, and ironically also on our environment in attempting to save that which didn't need saving. This was exposed in the 2004 House of Representatives Report into The Living Murray.

However, to turn this around, the political decision makers, both Federal and State, must be confronted with the indisputable fact that the 2007 Water Act and resultant Basin Plan is based on a fraud. This fraud was exposed by the late Prof John Briscoe (world leader in water policy and management) and more recently by Prof Peter Gell (peer reviewed and supported by the CSIRO).

All political parties are equally guilty of promoting this fraud and must be induced to acknowledge the error and set about to rectify this shemozzle in the national interest.

There are a number of actions that can take place prior to the absolute necessity, as outlined by Prof Briscoe, of the 2007 Water Act being re-drafted if Australia is to regain its standing as the world leader in arid zone water management. The re-drafting of the Water Act must clearly establish the triple bottom line principle. It must be oversighted by people who understand the issues. (Examples being Peter Millington, Don Blackmore, Mike Taylor and Pat Byrne.)

The immediate actions are:

• Affirming the Estuarine Status of the Lower Lakes utilising Prof Peter Gell's 2007 and 2020 reports and proposing Ken Jury's 'There is a Better Way' as the way forward. Highlighting the benefits accruing to South Australia:

- Adelaide, the safest city for water in Australia
- South Australian irrigation industry totally secure
- Lower Lakes never again going dry with sulphate acid soil problems
- Return of the mulloway fishing industry in the

Utilising the remaining Basin Plan funds to build Lock Zero, automate the barrages and address works in the Coorong as per Ken Jury's 'There is a Better Wey'.

- Running the River and Conveyance Losses.
 Should rightly be borne by the beneficiary, i.e.,
 CHEW, not by the upper states' irrigators prior to allocation assessment.
- The original intent of assuring Menindee replenishment prior to licenced Flood Plain Harvesting in Northern Rivers, needs proper and wide consultation with all concerned to achieve a balanced and fair outcome. Already some progress on this issue thanks to SRI and others.
- As per previously assured by COAG and NWI, a public register of water entitlements must happen, and overseas ownership revealed.
- Re water traders: They must be brought back to the original intent to facilitate trades but NOT to be speculators manipulating the market for their own benefit.
- Carryover of water should revert to the original intent – to be merely a very valuable insurance policy mechanism. That is, when Hume pre-releases or spills, carryover is progressively lost to allocation.
- Until that change is instituted, CEWH should NOT be allowed to carryover.
- The parking of water to carry over in other licences should be illegal.
- South Australian dilution flow of 300,000ML

should only be provided if ever the salinity at Morgan reaches 800EC. Currently, and for over 30 years, EC levels have been half to a quarter of that figure.

- The annual assessment of water availability should be explained at an open water forum with all interested parties able to be represented, be fully briefed and able to question the data and reasoning.
- The Snowy Resource should also be transparent, and the rules of operation and water delivery and timing be open for discussion. There is obvious conflict between Sir William Hudson's original aim of water for inland as against now maximising value from power generation.
- Following the re-drafting of the 2007 Water Act, the following matters need addressing:
- The CAP on extractions, locking in the SDLs must be reverted to the original intent of a temporary CAP whilst assessing river health needs. Deal with the needs and then remove the CAP.
- The environment's needs must be assessed as per the River Board's Plan, and after wide consultation with those affected, of:
 - identifying any areas of concern
 - putting in place the most cost-effective remedial measures
 - putting in place a monitoring process to gauge the results.
- All Commonwealth Environmental Water Holder's utilisation of water must be assessed on the same basis (as per 4. Above).
- Barmah/Millewa Watering Plan must revert to the original plan which was unanimously agreed to by the diverse Barmah/Millewa Watering Group AND there be no carryover provision.
- The change to the states' share, pre-Dartmouth Dam, of SA 3/13, NSW 5/13, VIC 5/13 to post-Dartmouth of supposed equal shares. This should

- be reviewed as, in low inflow years, the states are never equal.
- The part of SA share of High Priority (i.e., Water for Adelaide, towns, industry, horticulture) should be secure as for the upper states. However, their other needs should suffer restrictions like the upper states in low inflow years. Also, post Lock Zero being built, the Lower Lakes' needs will be greatly reduced. Hence, a change will be needed.
- Menindee Lakes should NOT be reduced in capacity through the SDL recovery process decommissioning parts.
- The deviation from our forefathers' concept of water being made available for production of a wide variety of irrigated goods. Not the recent idea of water going to high value crops with unbridled trade. As any high value crop can, like with the distortion by MIS schemes, quickly become a low value crop. In the meantime, whole industries, associated businesses, towns, capital outlays and jobs are put at risk. I fear for the future viability of large schemes (i.e., MIL, Goulburn Murray and even the small joint schemes) unless something is done to re-balance the water industry.
- As the economist Terry McCrann states with interest rates at 1% and governments able to borrow at that rate locked in for 30 years why are we not building new dams that would pay for themselves in a short number of years (e.g. Clarence Diversion, Murray Gates, Bradfield Scheme, Vic Goulburn proposal)? This is a once in a lifetime opportunity to develop inland Australia which is currently being ignored.

Australia is in desperate need of politicians who will not bow to fake science and popularism for political and monetary gain. They need to stand up for true science and base their decisions on getting results that are in the best interest of Australia and its citizens.



It has been such an honour to tell the story of Georgie and Meleeta White.

It is quite something to witness firsthand the bond that has never broken, despite being apart for more than 60 years. Having never had to endure those typical teenage years together of the bickering and emotional meltdowns, but also borrowing (or pinching) one another's clothes or listening to their favourite records together may sound, for some, like heaven, but these two no doubt feel a little ripped off they didn't experience it. Something else to consider is the missed celebrations such as birthdays, weddings and of course the birth of their children. But the hardest thing of all, for Georgie at least, was that she never had the chance to see her dear father again, or to see her sister, Dawn, who passed away shortly before Meleeta and Georgie reconnected. This is particularly difficult for Georgie to accept as her father is always in her thoughts, and always has been.

For Meleeta, all those years of not knowing where her little sister was may have had something to do with the path of self-destruction and unsettledness she endured for many years. What might have been if her sister had been by her side during that time? Perhaps it is best to leave the past in the past, the 'what ifs' and 'might have beens' should be filed away and not thought about again.

What matters now is they are to-

Although the interview was finished, Georgie wanted to show me a bunch of court documents that she had only seen recently for the first time.

"Have a look at these, Ali."

Wow. If this doesn't pull at your heart strings, then nothing will.

In slightly faded type written text, here her father pleads his case to the courts to help him to be able to take care of his daughters. He states the incompetency of their mother and the numerous times she abandoned her children. He desperately loved his children which is evident in his speech to the magistrate. But even he knows he is unable to provide the financial and secure life they deserve with no government support in those days.

It is so very hard for me to read; I can't imagine what this must be like for the girls.

Georgie looks back over the documents, and she is overcome with emotion. Without hesitation, Meleeta grabs her and hugs her tight - "don't worry, don't cry," she whispers to her. This, Meleeta tells me, is what sister Dawn used to say to her when she was upset as a littlie.

"There are so many similarities, Ali," Meleeta says.

Both the girls stand up and show me one of the physical similarities matching scars on their backs. Georgie's from spinal surgery, Meleeta's from a pressure sore due to being in a plaster cast after hips/legs surgery while a toddler. They also have identical lines on the palms of their hands.

Finally, I ask the girls about making contact back in September last year.

Meleeta explains. "I'd continued on the journey Dawn had started and finally had a person who could help me through the agency, 'Vanish'. Initially we kept hitting roadblocks because I had her name as Georgina and couldn't find her. After a lot of research, we discovered the name 'Georgia-Lee' and then she was found. Vanish told me they'd found her but naturally couldn't give her details to me."

Georgie continues. "Oh, I will never forget the day! I was sitting at home on the veranda and it was the anniversary of 9/11, so I was just sitting there thinking about all of that and how sad it was. The next thing my phone rang, and on the other end I hear, 'is your name Georgia White?' I said I was, and then the next thing she said was... (Georgie now in tears again) 'I have found your sister!' Well, I just about dropped the phone, I couldn't believe it! Then I made the phone call to 'Lee' and when she answered the phone, I said, 'Hello, Sis, it's me, Georgie!' I was excited and emotional and just, well, over the moon. I mean, after all this time, finally we find each other!"

Meleeta takes Georgie's hand once again, and with the two of them in tears now, they burst out laughing. Their joy is infectious, their gratitude for this moment overwhelming.

"There are so many pieces of the

puzzle that still haven't been found. We know we have other siblings but have no idea where. When we were separated, nothing was documented, not like it is these days, so that makes it very hard to find our extended family. We have so many questions, and hopefully by doing this interview it might spark someone's memory who was in the same situation we were and to reach out to us," Meleeta explains.

I'm curious to know what the future holds for the sisters.

Georgie goes first. "I haven't met with our sister, Tracey, yet so hopefully that will be on the cards. Right now, I'm just so happy to be sitting here with my big sister, to be able to touch her hand and laugh with her and learn all about her. Now I've got her, I can't bear the thought of being without her. We're already trying to organise her moving here to Leitchville with me and we'll buy a house together. We might go travelling when all this COVID-19 stuff is over. I want to see my dad's grave and Dawn's grave. We want to show each other the places we grew up in. This is just the beginning." Meleeta. "It sure is. I'm so excited

for the future. Hey, I got my sister

I walk away today with a wake-up call as to the undeniable bond shared by siblings. I am proud to say that I, too, share a closeness with my siblings, and after meeting Meleeta and Georgie I have never been so grateful for the childhood I got to spend with my brothers and share in the many ebbs and flows of life, knowing we've always been by one another's side.

For the years these adorable girls have missed, I am certain they will more than make up for it with every second of the day they spend together going forward. Every tear, every laugh, every cup of coffee and every random comment will now be etched in their memories and locked deep within their hearts. May everyday be even more special than the next for little Georgia-Lee and her protective big sister, Lee...







HERE WE COVID-19 AGAIN

Local businesses had to think on their feet when the snap announcement was made to lock down the whole of Victoria on Friday afternoon, giving them little time to make plans for the coming week. Schools were also unsure how to proceed at such short notice, with staff given little direction until after the home bell had already sounded. Confusion reigned for teachers, parents and students.

Weekend plans were quickly dropped as we donned our daggy 'around the house' clothes and switched to home maintenance mode. With the symphony of lawn mowers, Whipper Snippers and power tools playing through the neighbourhood airways, we emerged from the weekend with immaculate lawns and gardens and wondering what our next project would be.

Shops deemed as non-essential barely had time to scrawl a notice of closure for the front door before closing on Friday night. Having done this twice already and for extended periods, some of our food outlets quickly switched to 'lockdown' mode and offered takeaway only.

Like similar dine-in establishments, 3J's Coffee Shack and Beer Garden switched to offering a limited takeaway menu only. Caitlin Jenkins said they were disappointed to be in lockdown again, and thankful to their customers who have continued to support them.

Retailers closed their physical doors but Wendy Toma, owner of 3rd Bird Boutique, took to Facebook and Instagram to promote her sale items. "That's about all I can do at the moment," she said. "Hopefully we can all open our doors on Thursday. I have managed to make some sales, but nothing like it would be with the doors open."

The Cohuna Waterfront Holiday Park was on track for a full weekend of occupancy. That changed in an instant, with travellers already on site having to leave, and others enroute having to turn around and head home. Park manager, Helen Brooks, spent the days following the announcement processing refunds and arranging alternative bookings.

"We had to deal with people who were coming right up until Thursday. Some of them have been able to reschedule their stays, some of them don't have leave so they've postponed until a later date," Helen explained. Those who were already checked in were permitted to stay, but were still subject to the lockdown rules, and did not have access to park amenities such as the pool and jumping pillow that have been closed off, so many chose to return home.

One large group booking was a caravan club,

whose members all returned home following the announcement. "That impact probably ripples throughout Cohuna because they were planning to have functions at different food places, and activities. They decided to leave and go home," said Helen.

Pam Brown has resided in the Cohuna retirement village for just over a year. She looks forward to visits from her daughter, Di Bowles, but since COVID-19 hit last year, the visits and outings have been few and far between. When the announcement was made on Friday afternoon, Di made the trip into town for a visit before she, and other visitors, were locked out.

An anticipated outing to Pam's old home on Saturday had to be cancelled, coming as a disappointment to both Pam and Di. Outings have been limited for Pam, who is not used to mask wearing and COVID-19 social etiquette, and whose impression of the COVID-19 environment is built on what is portrayed on television. It has become an unfamiliar world outside the village walls. "She would be scared to go in a shop because she just doesn't know how it works," explained Di.

If visitor restrictions continue, Di and Pam will return to using the 'window', a window to allow residents and family members to see each other while talking on the phone. "It's hard because Mum can't hear very well. I sit outside, Mum sits inside. I ring the number in there and they have it on speaker for Mum to talk to me. She does like to actually see me," said Di.

Almost 12 months on from our first lock-down, we are still living in a world of uncertainty. From the forced time off work and school to the missed sports trainings, appointments and catch ups with friends and family, we have come to realise that plans can change at the drop of a hat. At the time this went to print, all Victorians were eagerly awaiting the announcement from Premier Andrews, an announcement that would outline our next steps. I am hoping the lockdown does not continue, but one thing I can be sure of, we are all a heck of a lot more resilient than we thought we were.

Lockdown returns for Victorians

"Oh no, not again"

Victorian schools were closed for three days this week due to the latest outbreak of COVID-19 cases in Melbourne. Following the announcement made on Friday afternoon that 'from 11.59pm February 12 until 11.59pm Wednesday February 17, the entire state of Victoria' was to go into lockdown, parents went into panic about how to make arrangements for their children, especially for those who had to work. A unanimous "oh no not this again," could almost be heard bellowing from every household throughout Victoria as many families are concerned the lockdown will go for longer, meaning the return to Remote Learning.

"It was very stressful when we heard the announcement," said one parent, "it was a mad panic of changing rosters at work to fit in with being able to stay home with the kids. I work nightshift so that was especially tricky, because I need to sleep when I finish a shift which is hard with the kids at home."

For some parents, the option of sending their children to school if it was not possible for them to stay home was not considered as teachers were not going to be planning any schoolwork, due to there not being enough time for them to organise tasks for the day.

"We were given the option of sending the kids if we had to work, but we had to send them with activities. So in the end, I just had to call my boss and take more annual leave," a frustrated mother told *The*

There was a positive spin on the 3-day lockdown, which was not having to rush

around in the morning packing schoolbags and lunches and dragging sleepy teenagers out of bed.

Keeping this thought in mind has been particularly reassuring for this father, who said -

"It should be more relaxed in the morning at least! I won't be strict about schoolwork these next few days. I'll just be happy if they do some quiet reading, it was stressful enough last time. I just hope it only lasts these next couple of days."

With 2021 hoping to be the school year without interruptions, it seems we are off to a shaky start.

I read a post on social media the other day about our children being some of the silent heroes in all of this. Constantly having to adapt to an unpredictable environment, the stress at home between their parents, on again off again classroom learning, frequently sanitising hands, keeping 1.5 metres distance between their friends, not being allowed to visit loved ones from interstate as well as just down the road – have all made for what must be a pretty scary world for them to live in, as they do so in silence because they are expected to go with the flow. Stop for a moment and think about these little champions who have had a very hard lesson in resilience. As parents, our priority should be to help them let go of the fear and make sure they are still able to be kids. Sure, we will never forget what it was like to go through a pandemic such as what we are going through now, but may we always remember these important years of our childrens' lives, it is called 'being a kid.'

Tiny paths meander through the hillside forests, made by charcoal burners, wood cutters, and forage gatherers. Along the paths at this time of the year, you will

Other parts of the trail wind through the ancient, twisted trunks of moss-encrusted rhododendron trees, mysterious and dark. We sat up on the high hillside, in the cool and quiet, to eat our picnic, and watch the eagles soar the updrafts below us - no agenda, refreshing, relaxing

- and I am thinking about how often my stresses are self-inflicted! Sometimes I need to remember to simply 'mind my business'.

One of the major potential stresses related to business operations here in Nepal, is competition. Many foreign owned companies avoid investing here for lots of reasons, one being 'brand security'. Recently, I needed to buy a new wristwatch. So, off to the nearby tiny, roadside, watch and sunglass shops. Such a variety, so many 'brands', all the wellknown names are displayed there, and all at 'bargain' prices. Of course, everyone knows they are fake brands, not original watches, they are cheap copies. Well, that is ok, my previous Nepali watch has worked for the past seven years... The cultural trend here is for copycat businesses, someone starts something, immediately many others will quickly follow suit. Competition is tough in the café business, and usually also in the guest house business. How to stand out from the crowd? To do it better, different, best?

It is easy to keep looking at what others are doing, and to fall into the trap of envy, or of making adjustments according to what others are doing. Easy to feel discouraged by the news of yet another new business competitor. But we are called to run our own race, I mean, we know it does not work well when runners in a sprint waste time by looking over their shoulder to check the position of their competitors. Seems God has a personal plan for us, and he will guide

and lead us in the best way forward for us. We can access his heavenly creativity, his wisdom, and enjoy the connections that he makes for us. By the grace of God, we can do what he calls us to do, what he gives us to do. It does not matter what the others are doing! Soaring on Wings Like Eagles



On hot summer days out in the rural areas of Australia I have often observed the wedgetail eagle effortlessly rising on thermals and being carried to a great altitude – up to 2,000 metres the scientists tell us. The near two and a half metre wings of the average adult wedge tailed eagle rarely flap as the eagle stays aloft for long periods of time searching for prey far below and perhaps enjoying the scenery!

I vividly remember another occasion when I was standing in the middle of a Western District swamp attempting to photograph the local fauna. I had been standing near motionless for quite a time in the cold,

knee deep water so that the resident birds adjusted to my presence. Unexpectedly, into this scene, I observed a large wedgetail eagle winging its way towards me - checking me out. Obviously, it had not seen me earlier, walking several hundred metres into the swamp. It continued towards me - its large wingspan and wedge-shaped tail looking more and more impressive as it approached. At a point only some 20m from me, it veered and landed atop a large red gum tree and continued to observe. Then with a final close 'pass' it flew off into the distance.

Seeing this wedge tailed eagle on the wing so close to me reminds me of a pas-



fortlessly in the sky.

Teff Success at Wakool

Last year it was difficult to deal with the bombardment of bad news that came from COVID-19. So, hearing about the great year that the McNaul family's paddock-to-plate agribusiness, 'Outback Harvest', has had was a refreshing

Fraser McNaul, who manages the branded side of the business, said "It's just a fact that Australian products are a premium price compared to imported goods. So, it's definitely been good for us having the borders closed and making it difficult for imported products to come in and compete with our Australian goods."

Outback Harvest is a family affair with Fraser's younger sister, Paige, working full time with administration and marketing for the online store, Lyn, Fraser's mother, packing and sending out the online orders, and Shane, Fraser's father, running the farming side of things. Fraser said, "It's still a small business, but it keeps me, my sister and my mum quite busy, and keeps Dad on his toes, growing a few different crops for us."

The McNaul family grows winter cereals, corn, rice as well as teff on its farm out at Wakool; the latter being the sole focus of Outback Harvest. Teff is an ancient grain of Ethiopia – which offers a gluten-free, healthy alternative to the plain flours currently out there. Fraser said, "I think it's important to note that our teff is kept completely separate to the rest of the farming. We've got dedicated gluten-free silos and augers to make sure there's no cross contamination." Fraser also mentioned, "In the gluten-free market, people are really vigilant about what they put in their mouths and are already quite conscious of where they are buying their products from."

Last year, everyone saw how outbreaks disrupt supply chains and way of life. So, hopefully as imports ramp back up in the future Outback Harvest, and other Australian farmers, will continue to have their goods represented more fairly in the market.
